In preparing for a National Conference presentation I have been asked to give, I have been intrigued by reading portions of two ACWW History books, the CWC "Our way of Life" book, and the NEHC and National FCE History books I'm using as background information. In my reading, I've come across the early history of the Country Women's Council. The initial title adopted in 1939 was the U.S. Liaison Committee of ACWW. The "Country Women's Council, USA" became the official name in 1946. We have a long, rich and fulfilling history.

What wonderful organizations we are part of. I'm learning about the tenacity, courage and

strength of the women who came before us to set the foundation of this great ACWW organization. I'm understanding more about the desires those women had to better the lives of women and families the world over. Those desires are still evident in ACWW members now.

An excerpt from "An Official History of NEHC, 1936-1990" reads: "ACWW membership has helped Homemakers develop an unselfish concern for the welfare of others and a desire to provide educational opportunities for better homes and happier families worldwide. It has encouraged program links and interaction with families in other countries and has

provided an avenue to promote peace among nations."

As I've read the material on the resolutions in the books, I've found that as far back as the resolutions go our ACWW sisters have been concerned with peace, food production, safety for women and children, safety and help for immigrants, literacy and the environment in which they lived. The resolutions reflected the wants and needs of their time; but they also reflect the wants and the needs of those around us now.

***Iron Deficiency***

Moved by CWC USA

2nd by Illinois Assoc. for Home & Community Education

Be it resolved that ACWW societies and members urge their governments and health organizations to continue financing and supporting the research needed to

eliminate the world-wide incidence of iron deficiency.

"Without proper iron levels, children's cognitive development is affected. Pregnancies are at greater risk for premature births and babies have a greater difficulty bonding with mothers,"

According to the World Health Organization. Iron deficiency is the most common micronutrient deficiency worldwide and leads to microcytic anemia,

2 billion - people over 30% of the world's population - are anemic due to iron deficiency, affecting not only the underdeveloped countries of the world but the industrialized countries as well! ### *Registration of old*

#### *Landfills*

Mover: Norges Kvinne Og Familieforbund, Norway

Be it resolved that ACWW and its member organizations urge the governments of all countries to map and register the presence of old landfill sites. The register should record the presence of dangerous substances (if known) and the risk of future leakage. In addition, we urge each country to develop a strategy for the rehabilitation of these sites.

Supporting statement:

Today our knowledge of waste disposal, both

industrial and domestic, is considerably greater than in the past. Modern landfill sites are strictly controlled by international regulations. Our concern is for historical sites, which may have been sealed and forgotten, without recording their locations or contents. In the long term, these forgotten disposal sites can be the source of poisonous gases and other environmental pollutants. An excavation of an unknown site could trigger an environmental disaster. A registration and mapping of these sites will also contribute to future development plans.

### *Elimination of Dog*

#### *Mediated Rabies*

Mover: Country Women's Association of Victoria, Australia

Be it resolved that the Associated Country Women of the World member societies support rabies education globally and support "Zero by 30". This initiative of the World Health Organization, World Organization for Animal Health, Food and Agriculture Organi-

zation and Global Alliance for Rabies Control seeks to eliminate dog mediated rabies by 2030 through: rabies education programs on bite preventions, expanding dog rabies vaccination coverage to stop transmission, improving access to post exposure prophylaxis and by lobbying governments to provide the funds to achieve this.

Each year 59,000 people die from rabies. 40% of these deaths are children of poor and vulner-

able populations living in remote locations. Vaccinating dogs is the most cost-effective strategy for preventing rabies in people. "Zero by 30" will focus on improving access to post exposure prophylaxis for bite victims, education and expanding dog vaccinations to reduce the risk of exposure to humans.



Protect our pets and those who come in contact with them. Vaccinate against rabies.

## Triennial Highlights from First Timer - Jane Chapman

Amazing, inspiring, memorable, eye-opening educational are just a few of the adjectives I would use to describe my first time at an ACWW Triennial! From the opening ceremony, when Australia, the host country, lead the flag parade of member nations to the end when the reverse was done with Malaysia, the next Triennial host, removing their flag first was incredible. All of this left the small-town girl from Southern Illinois in awe!

There were seven sessions over the six-day period as well as area meetings. Each session included voting on the some of the 18 resolutions and other resolutions pertaining to the bye-laws and rules. I had the honor of providing the support material for the Iron Deficiency resolution, one of the two resolutions that CWC/USA proposed the other resolution was on pollinators, I am happy to announce that both resolutions were approved. The resolutions, after being approved, will now be the focus of the ACWW over the next three years and will be presented to the United Nations for consideration. Most sessions had

keynote speakers who spoke on topics like eradicating rabies, to human trafficking, and a young women's story of becoming CEO of a huge sheep farm that raises sheep and makes the wool into fabric that is sold worldwide. I must include the final keynote speaker, Kelly Nash, who spoke on the importance of loving your body in a humorous and musical manner.

Monday evening of the conference was the "gala" and it was quite a gala! You either received lamb or stuffed chicken wrapped in cheese served with a potato shaped like a deck of cards, heirloom carrots, wine, and dessert of poached pear, ginger cream and soft white chocolate sponge. A country western band played during the entire Gala. The Aussie's do like their music, everyone danced and sang along! I must say that all the foods served to me anywhere in Australia and at the conference were presented in a very beautiful manner, sometimes with real flowers or greens such as rocket which is a type of lettuce to us! Morning and afternoon breaks were given and hot tea, coffee, and cookies were offered
