Ruth Buxton Sayre was known as the "First Lady of the Farm" and inspired millions of rural women around the world to improve themselves and their communities with her practicality, humor, decency, and common sense. As a young farm mother, she began her life work in striving for better conditions for farm women and their families by organizing her neighbors for college extension classes. She earned high posts in state, national and international organizations and served as ACWW President from 1947-1953.

#### **ACWW Resolution Addressing Food Waste**

Be it resolved that ACWW facilitates both action and advocacy on the issue of food waste, recognizing that food waste occurs throughout the global food supply chain, and that coordinated action is required to migrate food loss and wastage at every stage.

#### International Day of Awareness of Food Loss and Waste

This day is observed on September 29th and is co-convened by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP). The day's goal is to raise awareness of food loss and waste, and to promote action to reduce it. The 2024 theme is "Climate Finance for Food Loss and Waste Reduction".

At least half of the total grains of our daily food intake should be whole grains. At the present time, most Americans meet the USDA recommendations for total grain consumption, although unfortunately, 98 percent fall below recommendations for whole grains and 74 percent exceed the limits for refined grains. Begin your tour of Cincinnati from your hotel. Pass the heart of the city at **Fountain Square** where throngs of people gather for brown-bag lunches, concerts, sports and political rallies. You will pass the Contemporary Arts Center, Procter and Gamble's International Headquarters and the Taft Museum in beautiful Lytle Park. Become familiar with many of Cincinnati's most well-known landmarks including Union Terminal, Music Hall, Washington Park, Smale Riverfront Park, Bicentennial Commons, Paycor Stadium and Great American Ball Park – home of the Bengals and Reds and the new FC Cincinnati soccer home TQL stadium. Cross the Ohio River to Kentucky's historic **Riverside Drive** with its antebellum homes. Pass the Cathedral Basilica in Covington. While in Kentucky, you will enjoy a breathtaking view of the Cincinnati skyline.

Climb some of Cincinnati's famous hills and take in the spectacular views. Enjoy the old-world charm of Mount **Adams** with its "shot-gun" row homes and charming district of shops and restaurants. Picturesque **Eden Park** is the home of the Cincinnati Art Museum, Playhouse in the Park and Krohn Conservatory. **There** will be short stops along the way for restroom breaks and picture taking!

2 Hour stop at the **National Underground Railroad Freedom Center** located on the north bank of the Ohio River. This museum celebrated Freedom's heroes from the era of the underground railroad along with all efforts to abolish human enslavement and securing freedom for all people. This architectural masterpiece holds the only known surviving rural jail transported from its original Kentucky location.

**The total cost for the tour will be \$60.00**. This includes your bus fare, museum entrance fee, tour guide, and driver's gratuity. Reservations are due by June 21, 2025
